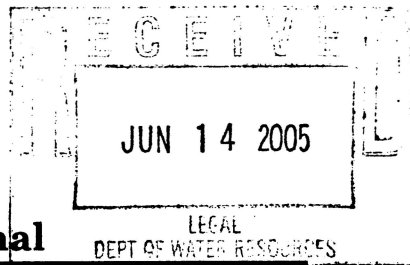

**THE SPECIAL MASTER'S APPROVAL
OF FINAL SETTLEMENTS AND
RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE COURT**

This litigation began in 1952 when the State of Arizona invoked the original jurisdiction of this Court to resolve a dispute with the State of California over the extent of the right of each state to use water from the Colorado River System. The United States intervened seeking water rights on behalf of, among others, five Indian Reservations on the Colorado River located partly in California. California successfully challenged the asserted boundaries of the Fort Mojave and Colorado River reservations before Special Master Rifkind, but this Court found it unnecessary to resolve those disputes at that time.

In the intervening years Solicitors of the Department of Interior addressed the matter of Reservation boundaries a number of times, but this Court did not resolve those disputes. An excellent and useful history of the controversy can be found in a syllabus contained in the opinion of this Court in *State of Arizona v. State of California et al.*, No. 8 Original, 530 U.S. 392 (June 19, 2000).

A 1964 Decree in *Arizona v. California*, (376 U.S. 340, *Arizona I*) and subsequent Supplemental Decrees in 1979 (439 U.S. 419) and 1984 (466 U.S. 144) governed the parties for a good number of years until on July 19, 1989, the State Parties (the States of California and Arizona, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, and the Coachella Valley Water District) moved the Court to reopen the 1964 Decree in order to finally determine the disputed boundaries of the Fort Mojave, Colorado River and Fort Yuma Indian Reservations in order to establish the water rights of the three reservations and the tribes therein.

Robert McKay, Professor Emeritus at New York University's School of Law, was appointed Special Master to conduct the reopened proceedings. Following his death the undersigned was appointed to succeed him on November 13, 1990. (498 U.S. 964.)

Thereafter the proceedings before the Special Master have included extensive discovery by the parties, numerous motions, meetings and hearings, and as the case proceeded, a resultant twenty-five memorandum opinions and/or procedural orders.

In the course of these proceedings, a settlement was reached in the Fort Mojave Indian Reservation boundary dispute, reflected in a Stipulation and Agreement dated January 14, 1998. The agreement covered the location of the disputed boundary and awarded the Fort Mojave Tribe certain water diversion rights.

Also in the course of these proceedings, a series of Special Master opinions decided the Colorado River Indian Reservation boundary dispute. The State of California, the United States, the Colorado River Indian Tribe, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California and the Coachella Valley Water District subsequently entered into an agreement dated February 23, 1999, settling all water rights disputes associated with the disputed boundary, but agreed, as between the parties, to negate the Special Master's opinion and leave the boundary dispute unresolved.

In my Report and Recommendation to the Court of July 28, 1999, I recommended the acceptance and approval of the two settlements described above, and in an order dated June 19, 2000, the Court accepted the recommendation and Supplemental Decree I had submitted and invited objections from the Parties. There being none, the Supplemental Decree reflecting the Fort Mojave and Colorado River settlements was issued by the Court on June 19, 2000. (*State of Arizona v. State of California, et al.*, 530 U.S. 392.)

As mentioned earlier, the reopening of the 1964 Decree involved, in addition to the two matters settled as described above, the claim before the Special Master by the

Quechan Tribe that 25,000 acres of land were part of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation and therefore entitled the Quechan Tribe to a consequent increase in the water rights allocated to the Reservation by the 1964 Decree. In an earlier segment of this litigation referred to as Arizona I, the United States had not asserted this claim on behalf of the Quechan Tribe; but in the instant litigation the United States supports the claim of the Tribe.

After extensive briefing by the parties, I held in Memorandum Opinion and Order No. 4 issued on September 6, 1991, that the Quechan Tribe was precluded from asserting that claim by reason of a final judgment in the United States Court of Claims in which the Tribe was awarded \$15,000,000 against the United States in 1983 for the taking of the disputed lands in question herein. I held that that consent judgment extinguished the Tribe's claim to the disputed boundary lands.

The United States and the Quechan Tribe filed exceptions with this Court. The Court approved the Fort Mojave and Colorado River settlements, but disagreed with my reasoning and remanded the outstanding water rights claims associated with the disputed boundary lands of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation to me for determination on the merits. (*Arizona v. California, et al.*, 530 U.S. 392 (2000), *Arizona III.*) The remanded case proceeded thereafter with the following parties: the State of Arizona, the State of California, the Quechan Tribe of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation, the United States of America, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, and the Coachella Valley Water District.

After extensive discovery, denial of the State Parties' summary judgment motion, and preparation for hearing (set for April 25, 2005) the parties, with full knowledge of the facts and issues, were directed to enter into one last settlement discussion, and with the able assistance of

Owen Olpin, attorney at law, a mediator employed for that purpose, reached the full settlement reflected in the two settlement agreements and the proposed Supplemental Decree herein recommended to the Court.

I. The California Settlement

The California Settlement Agreement contains various provisions regarding the Quechan Tribe's entitlement to additional diversions of Colorado River water, circumstances in which the Tribe's additional diversions may become available to Metropolitan, a commitment by the United States to make a decision on Yuma Island decree accounting, recognition of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation boundaries in California for some or all purposes, and disclaimers by the Tribe and the United States of title to certain lands in the historic bed of the Colorado River, among other provisions. Some of the main provisions of the Settlement Agreement are summarized below. This summary is not intended to supplant in any way the specific terms of the actual agreements submitted herewith, which agreements will govern the parties upon approval by this Court.

1. The Tribe shall be entitled to an additional diversion of up to 20,000 acre feet (AF) of water per year of which 13,000 AF shall become available to the Tribe immediately upon entry of a supplemental decree by the Court. The remaining 7,000 AF shall become available to the Tribe beginning in calendar year 2025. All of these additional diversions will have a priority date of January 9, 1884, and will be subject to the same terms and conditions that apply to the Tribe's water diversions under the *Arizona I* decree. The Tribe and the United States on behalf of the Tribe also agree not to claim any additional reserved or other water rights from the Colorado River for

lands in the Reservation or for the Tribe after entry of a supplemental decree by the Court.

2. If the Tribe limits its utilization of the additional diversions provided for in the Settlement Agreement, and allows the water to pass through the California priority system and be diverted by Metropolitan, then Metropolitan agrees to pay the Tribe \$125 per AF escalated at 2.5% annually for water available for use and received by Metropolitan. Metropolitan has an option to terminate such payments starting in 2035 in which case the Tribe retains its right to divert the water for itself. The additional 20,000 AF of diversion to which the Tribe is entitled shall be available for any beneficial use within California only by the Tribe or by Metropolitan, and no one else. The United States does not warrant or guarantee that any water will be available to Metropolitan under the Settlement Agreement.
3. The United States and the Tribe expressly disclaim any property interest in or title to, the western half of the last natural bed of the Colorado River (before the avulsion of 1920) ("riverbed lands"). The Parties, however, may dispute the extent and precise location of the riverbed lands. The Tribe, the United States and California also do not agree whether the riverbed lands lie within or outside the Reservation boundaries.
4. The Tribe, the United States, Metropolitan and CVWD agree to recognize and waive any challenge to the validity of the 1981 Secretarial Determination regarding the boundary of the Reservation, subject to certain reservations of rights regarding a pending action entitled *Quechan Indian Tribe v. United States of America, et al.*, Case No. 02 CV 01096 IEG (AJB) (U.S.D.C.S.D.Cal.), the Parker-Davis 161 kV

Transmission Line, and the surveys implementing the 1978 Secretarial Decision and the 1981 Secretarial Determination. For water rights purposes only, California recognizes the provisions of the 1981 Secretarial Determination regarding the boundaries of the Reservation in California except for the riverbed lands which California claims as sovereign State land. California expressly reserves the right to contest the boundaries of the Reservation or to contend that the Reservation in California has been diminished or disestablished by federal legislation. The United States and the Tribe reserve all their arguments in opposition. However, if California is successful in any such contest, California nevertheless will not challenge nor oppose the Tribe's use of the water rights within the geographic area encompassed by surveys implementing the 1978 Secretarial Decision and the 1981 Secretarial Determination, excluding and excepting therefrom the riverbed lands. All Parties agree that any future changes in the boundaries or status of the Reservation will not affect or limit the quantity of diversions that are available to the Tribe or to Metropolitan under the Settlement Agreement.

5. The Settlement Agreement is intended to conclusively settle all matters at issue between the Parties in *Arizona v. California* with respect to the water rights of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in California. The Settlement Agreement shall become effective upon unqualified approval by the Supreme Court and the issuance and entry of a supplemental decree.

II. The Arizona Settlement

The Arizona Settlement Agreement contains various provisions regarding the Quechan Tribe's entitlement to additional diversions of Colorado River water and recognition of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation boundaries in Arizona, among other provisions. Some of the main provisions of the Settlement Agreement are summarized below. This summary is not intended to supplant in any way the specific terms of the actual agreements submitted herewith, which agreements will govern the parties upon approval by this Court.

1. The Tribe shall be entitled to an additional diversion of up to 6,350 acre-feet (AF) of water per year. The additional diversions will have a priority date of January 8, 1884, and are subject to the same terms and conditions as apply to the Reservation's water allocation in the Supreme Court's 1964 Decree in *Arizona I*. (See *Arizona v. California*, 376 U.S. 340 (1964).)
2. The Parties also agree that the boundary for the Reservation in Arizona shall be the boundary as described in the Executive Order of January 9, 1884, subject to applicable federal law regarding the movement of the Colorado River. For the purposes of their agreement, the Parties agree further that the Bureau of Land Management Cadastral Survey dated October 1980, shall be the depiction of the exterior boundary of the Reservation in Arizona.
3. The Settlement Agreement merges all prior negotiations and understandings between the Parties in *Arizona v. California* with respect to the water rights of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in Arizona.

4. The Settlement Agreement merges all prior negotiations and understandings between the Parties, contains their entire agreement and shall be effective upon execution by all Parties, unqualified approval by the Supreme Court, and issuance of an appropriate supplemental decree. It represents a negotiated settlement with respect to all matters at issue among the Parties in the proceeding now before the Supreme Court and does not constitute and should not be construed as an admission or acceptance of any legal contentions or arguments of any other party in this or any other proceeding.

Exhibit A to this recommendation is the Settlement Agreement of February 14, 2005, by and among the Quechan Indian Tribe of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation, the United States of America, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, the Coachella Valley Water District and the State of California.

Exhibit B is the Settlement Agreement of February 17, 2005, by and among the Quechan Tribe of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation, the United States of America and the State of Arizona, and includes the copy of the Bureau of Land Management Cadastral Survey of October 22, 1980, reflecting the agreed boundary of the Reservation in Arizona.

Exhibit C is the proposed Supplemental Decree effectuating the two settlement agreements.



That joint motion is granted and the two settlements resolving all disputes referred to me are recommended to the Court. This approval, if granted, will be the basis for the entry by the Court of the proposed Supplemental Decree tendered to the Court herewith.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT IN *ARIZONA v. CALIFORNIA* BY AND AMONG THE QUECHAN INDIAN TRIBE OF THE FORT YUMA INDIAN RESERVATION, THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, THE METROPOLITAN WATER DISTRICT OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA, COACHELLA VALLEY WATER DISTRICT, AND THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

This Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into this 14th day of February, 2005, by and among the Quechan Indian Tribe of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation ("Tribe"), the United States of America ("United States"), the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California ("Metropolitan"), the Coachella Valley Water District ("CVWD"), and the State of California ("California"), collectively referred to in this Agreement as the "Parties." Metropolitan, CVWD and California are collectively referred to in this Agreement as the "California Parties."

I

RECITALS

A. On October 10, 1989, the United States Supreme Court ("Supreme Court") granted the motion of the California Parties to reopen the Decree in *Arizona v. California*, 373 U.S. 546 (1963) ("*Arizona I*") to determine disputed boundary claims with respect to the Fort Mojave, Colorado River, and Fort Yuma Indian Reservations. *Arizona v. California* 493 U.S. 886 (1989). The Supreme Court referred the matter to a Special Master. 493 U.S. 971 (1989).

B. The disputed boundary issue concerning the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation involves water rights claimed for lands that are the subject of a purported 1893 Agreement between the Tribe and the United States, an 1894 statute ratifying that 1893 Agreement, 28 Stat. 332, a 1904 statute, 33 Stat. 234, a December 20, 1978 Decision of the Secretary of the Interior ("1978 Secretarial Decision"), and a 1981 Determination and Directive of the Secretary of the Interior regarding the boundaries of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation, published at 46 Federal Register 11372 (February 6, 1981) ("1981 Secretarial Determination").

C. In his Memorandum Opinion and Order No. 4, September 6, 1991, Special Master McGarr ruled that the United States and the Tribe were precluded from asserting claims for water rights for the disputed boundary lands by virtue of a 1983 consent judgment of the United States Claims Court in *Quechan Tribe of the Fort Yuma Reservation v. United States*, No. 320 (Cl. Ct. Aug. 11, 1983). The Supreme Court rejected the Special Master's recommended ruling and remanded "the outstanding water rights claims associated with the disputed boundary lands of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation to the Special Master for determination on the merits." *Arizona v. California*, 530 U.S. 392, 419-420 (2000).

D. This Agreement is intended to resolve the water rights issue referenced above and to conclude this litigation in *Arizona v. California*.

E. In connection with this settlement, the Parties have investigated the existence of practicably irrigable acreage and the feasibility of development on the disputed boundary lands. There is a bona fide, good faith dispute among

the Parties as to the extent of practicably irrigable acreage and the feasibility of development on the disputed boundary lands. The Parties desire to enter into this Agreement to compromise and resolve, among other things, the issue of the amount of water that should be available to the Tribe for such practicably irrigable acreage and development thereon, and the place where such water may be used, and to provide an option to the Tribe to forego such development, and thereby ensure that such water continues to be available for use by Metropolitan, upon certain terms and conditions described hereinafter.

II

PURPOSE

This Agreement conclusively settles all matters now at issue between the Parties in this litigation with respect to the water rights of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in California. Except as expressly provided herein, no modification of this Agreement shall be effective unless it is made with the consent of the Parties hereto.

III

SETTLEMENT TERMS AND CONDITIONS

A. Water Rights

1. In addition to the amounts of water decreed to the United States for the benefit of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in *Arizona I*, 376 U.S. 340 (1964), the Tribe shall be entitled to an annual (calendar year) quantity of water, that is subject to and defined by the terms and conditions in paragraph 2 below, not to exceed (a) 20,000 acre-feet of diversions from the mainstream of the Colorado River or (b) the amount of Colorado River water

necessary to supply the consumptive use required for irrigation of 2,998.50 acres, and for the satisfaction of related uses, whichever of (a) or (b) is less, for lands within the boundaries of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in the State of California.

2. The Parties agree that the additional water allocation in paragraph 1 above shall become available for the benefit of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation as follows:

(a) 13,000 acre-feet, or the amount necessary to supply the consumptive use required for irrigation of 1,949.03 acres, and for the satisfaction of related uses, whichever is less, shall become available to the Tribe immediately upon entry of a supplemental decree by the Supreme Court in this matter;

(b) An additional 7,000 acre-feet, or the amount necessary to supply the consumptive use required for irrigation of 1,049.47 acres, and for the satisfaction of related uses, whichever is less, shall become available to the Tribe beginning in calendar year 2035, and continuing thereafter.

3. The Parties agree that the additional diversion of Colorado River water described in paragraphs 1 and 2 above shall be included in a supplemental decree to be issued by the Supreme Court at the conclusion of the present proceedings with a priority date of January 9, 1884, and that such diversions shall be subject to the same terms and conditions that apply to the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation water diversions that are decreed in the Supreme Court's 1964 Decree in *Arizona I*, as supplemented. Upon entry of that supplemental decree by the Supreme Court, the Tribe shall become entitled to divert the water defined in paragraphs 1 and 2 in accordance with the terms and conditions therein.

4. Metropolitan and the Tribe further agree that if the Tribe chooses to limit currently proposed development and utilization of practicably irrigable acreage, which would require the diversion of any of the water available to the Tribe under paragraph 2 above, and instead allows such water to pass through the priority system and be diverted by Metropolitan in accordance with Metropolitan's water storage and delivery contracts with the Secretary of the Interior and related agreements, then Metropolitan agrees to pay the Tribe the rate identified in paragraph 6 below, provided that such water is actually available for use and is received by Metropolitan.

5. Beginning in 2035 and continuing thereafter, Metropolitan shall have the option, in its sole discretion, to terminate any payments to the Tribe for water that may be available to Metropolitan under paragraph 4 above, by providing advance written notice to the Tribe one year prior to termination of the payments. If Metropolitan terminates payments, the Tribe retains the right to divert the water for its use on lands within the boundaries of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in California in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Supreme Court's decrees in *Arizona v. California*.

6. For purposes of this Agreement, the rate that Metropolitan shall pay to the Tribe for water available to Metropolitan under paragraph 4 above shall be \$125 per acre-foot of diversions annually, escalated at 2.5% per year beginning on the first day of the year following the year that such payments first commence. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, this paragraph may be amended by the mutual consent of the Tribe, the United States and Metropolitan without the approval of the other Parties to this Agreement.

7. In accordance with the terms of the Quantification Settlement Agreement by and among Imperial Irrigation

District, The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, and Coachella Valley Water District, dated October 10, 2003 ("QSA"), CVWD agrees not to object to, or interfere with, the receipt and usage by Metropolitan of water that may become available to Metropolitan under paragraph 4 above, provided that CVWD retains all of its rights under the Law of the River with respect to the receipt and usage of such water by Metropolitan after the QSA has expired.

8. The Parties agree that the additional diversions of Colorado River water described in paragraphs 1 and 2 above shall be available for any beneficial use within California solely by: (a) the Tribe on lands within the boundaries of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation or within the geographic area encompassed by surveys implementing the 1978 Secretarial Decision and 1981 Secretarial Determination, excluding and excepting therefrom those lands comprising the western half of the last natural bed of the Colorado River (before the avulsion of 1920) should the surveys include those lands, and/or (b) Metropolitan pursuant to paragraph 4 above, and not by any other water user or on any other lands.

9. The Parties agree that any future changes in the boundaries or status of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation will not affect or limit the quantity of diversions of Colorado River water that are available to the Tribe and to Metropolitan under this Agreement, and they further agree that the Tribe may make use of such water in California within the geographic area encompassed by the surveys implementing the 1978 Secretarial Decision and 1981 Secretarial Determination, excluding and excepting therefrom those lands comprising the western half of the last natural bed of the Colorado River (before the avulsion of 1920) should the surveys include those lands.

10. If the provisions of this Agreement that make water available to Metropolitan are challenged, the United States assumes no responsibility to undertake any legal defense of such provisions, and Metropolitan and the Tribe assume sole risk and responsibility that such provisions comply with prior decrees in *Arizona v. California*, and with all applicable federal law. The United States does not warrant or guarantee that any water will actually be delivered to Metropolitan pursuant to the terms of this Agreement. The Parties agree that none of them will challenge the validity of this Agreement, including the provisions that make water available to Metropolitan, or take any action to frustrate its implementation, subject to the reservation of rights of CVWD in paragraph 7 above.

11. The Parties agree that the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation's present perfected water rights as set forth in the Decree in *Arizona I*, 376 U.S. 340 (1964), shall remain undisturbed and shall not be affected in any manner by the terms of this Agreement.

12. The Tribe and Metropolitan agree to enter into good faith negotiations regarding a fallowing/forbearance agreement for acreage that is subject to the Supreme Court's award of water in its 1964 Decree in *Arizona I*, 376 U.S. 340 (1964). The Tribe and Metropolitan expressly assume the risk of drafting an appropriate fallowing/forbearance agreement that meets the requirements of the decrees in *Arizona v. California* and all applicable federal law, and the United States assumes no liability for, and does not warrant or guarantee, the actual delivery to Metropolitan of any water subject to any such fallowing/forbearance agreement between Metropolitan and the Tribe.

13. After entry of a supplemental decree by the Supreme Court in this matter, neither the Tribe nor the United States on behalf of the Tribe shall claim or be

entitled to any additional reserved or other water rights from the Colorado River for lands in the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in California or for the Tribe.

14. Upon entry of a supplemental decree by the Supreme Court in this matter, the United States and the Tribe waive and extinguish any claim, cognizable in law or equity, by the Tribe or by the United States for the benefit of the Tribe, of a right to use water in amounts in excess of the amounts set out in the 1964 Decree in *Arizona v. California*, the 1979 Supplemental Decree, and the supplemental decree to be entered in this matter, and waive and extinguish any claim with respect to a priority date other than the priority dates set out in said decrees.

15. (a) Upon entry of a supplemental decree by the Supreme Court in this matter, the Tribe waives and extinguishes any claim, cognizable in law or equity, against the United States, the California Parties, and all governmental subdivisions thereof, that such entities diverted, pumped, or impounded (or permitted others to divert, pump, or impound), waters of the Colorado River that had been decreed to the Tribe or to the United States for the benefit of the Tribe, or that were or could have been claimed by the Tribe or by the United States for the benefit of the Tribe prior to the date of the entry of a supplemental decree by the Supreme Court in this matter. In addition, upon entry of that supplemental decree, the United States waives and extinguishes any claim, cognizable in law or equity, against the California Parties, and all governmental subdivisions thereof, that such entities diverted, pumped, or impounded (or permitted others to divert, pump, or impound), waters of the Colorado River that had been decreed to the Tribe or to the United States for the benefit of the Tribe, or that were or could have been claimed by the Tribe or by the United States for the benefit of the Tribe prior to the date of the entry of a supplemental decree by the Supreme Court in this matter.

(b) Notwithstanding paragraph 15 (a) above, the Tribe and the United States expressly reserve the right to claim that third-parties other than the California Parties and their governmental subdivisions diverted, pumped, impounded (or permitted others to divert, pump, or impound) waters of the Colorado River that were decreed to the Tribe in *Arizona I*, 376 U.S. 340 (1964) *provided that* any such claim or enforcement action: (a) is not against and does not affect any of the California Parties or any of their governmental subdivisions, officers, employees, contractors or agents, and does not diminish the waiver afforded the California Parties in paragraph 15(a) above, and (b) neither directly or indirectly diminishes the quantity of Colorado River water received by the California Parties nor affects the timing or terms and conditions of delivery of such water to the California Parties that would otherwise occur in the absence of any claim or enforcement action against third-parties by the Tribe and/or the United States.

B. Decision on Yuma Island Decree Accounting

The United States agrees that, no later than March 15, 2005, it will take final agency action deciding whether consumptive use of Colorado River water on the "Yuma Island" should be charged to Priority 2 under the California Seven Party Agreement of August 18, 1931. Metropolitan in its sole discretion may extend this deadline. The United States makes no commitment in this Agreement to undertake any remedial or other enforcement action as a result of this decision about consumptive use on the "Yuma Island," but reserves all of its rights to determine appropriate enforcement or non-enforcement in its discretion. The California Parties also reserve all of their rights, and expressly do not waive any rights that they may have to seek judicial review of the United States' decision on

consumptive use on the "Yuma Island," or the enforcement or lack thereof that results from such decision. For purposes of this Agreement, "Yuma Island" means the lands that are located between the present channel of the Colorado River and the abandoned levee, commonly known as the Reservation Levee, originally constructed prior to the avulsion of the Colorado River in 1920, the consumptive use of water on which is currently being charged to California in the *Arizona v. California* decree accounting of the Bureau of Reclamation.

C. Recognition of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation Boundary in California

Metropolitan, CVWD, the United States and the Tribe agree, without reservation, to recognize and waive any challenge to the validity of the 1981 Secretarial Determination attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and by this reference incorporated herein. The United States and the Tribe hereby reserve all arguments in that action in the United States District Court for the Southern District of California entitled *Quechan Indian Tribe, Plaintiff, vs. United States of America, et al., Defendants*, Case No. 02 CV 01096 IEG (AJB). Notwithstanding the foregoing reservation, Metropolitan, CVWD and the Tribe agree, and the Tribe shall not dispute, that the United States has the right to install, construct, reconstruct, maintain, operate, inspect, repair, enlarge, alter, replace and remove the Parker-Davis 161 kV Transmission Line in accordance with the 1981 Secretarial Determination. Metropolitan, CVWD, and the Tribe reserve their rights to challenge the surveys implementing the 1978 Secretarial Decision and the 1981 Secretarial Determination, or any future survey or resurvey of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation, in appropriate administrative and judicial proceedings.

D. Recognition by the State of California of Geographic Area in California Within Which Fort Yuma Indian Reservation Water Rights May Be Used

For water rights purposes only, California agrees to recognize the provisions of the 1981 Secretarial Determination regarding the boundaries of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in California, except those lands comprising the western half of the last natural bed of the Colorado River (before the avulsion of 1920), should the surveys implementing the 1978 Secretarial Decision and the 1981 Secretarial Determination include these lands. "For water rights purposes only" means solely for the identification of the geographic area within which the reserved water rights decreed to the United States for the benefit of the Tribe and its allottees in this action may be used. It is not recognition of that demarcation as establishing political jurisdiction as between California or its political subdivisions and the Tribe, or for any other purpose. For all other purposes, California expressly reserves the right, in any judicial, administrative or legislative proceeding, to contest the boundaries of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation, to contend that the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in California has been diminished or disestablished by the 1893 Agreement, the 1894 or 1904 Acts, or any subsequent federal legislation, and to challenge the 1978 Secretarial Decision and 1981 Secretarial Determination, including the provisions regarding the reservation boundaries. The United States and the Tribe reserve all their arguments in opposition. If any such contest, contention, or challenge by California is successful, California nevertheless will not challenge or oppose the Tribe's use of the water rights decreed in this action as provided in paragraph A8. California also reserves the right to challenge the surveys implementing the 1978 Secretarial Decision and the 1981 Secretarial Determination, or any future survey or

resurvey of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in appropriate administrative and judicial proceedings.

E. Riverbed Land

California contends that title to the western half of the last natural bed of the Colorado River (before the avulsion of 1920), which riverbed lies either within or adjacent to the boundaries of the Fort Yuma Reservation in California, passed to California in 1850 by operation of the Equal Footing Doctrine. The United States and the Tribe expressly disclaim any property interest in, or title to, these lands (hereinafter "riverbed lands"). The Parties, however, may dispute the extent and precise location of the riverbed lands. The Bureau of Land Management (hereinafter "BLM") is currently completing a survey of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation. The Parties retain and do not waive any of their claims with respect to the extent and location of riverbed lands within the Reservation boundaries: the Tribe and the United States claim that the riverbed lands lie within the Reservation, while California claims that the riverbed lands lie outside of the Reservation boundaries. This Agreement and settlement between the Parties is neither dependent nor conditioned upon resolution of the riverbed lands issues described in this paragraph. This Agreement and settlement of this litigation will become fully effective regardless of any later resolution or non-resolution of those issues.

F. Scope, Effective Date and Waiver

This Agreement merges all prior negotiations and understandings between the Parties, contains their entire agreement, and shall be effective upon unqualified approval by the Supreme Court in these proceedings and the issuance and entry of an appropriate supplemental decree. Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to create or give validity to any claim by the Tribe against the United States or in any way constitute acknowledgment of the validity of any claims by the Tribe against the United States. In addition, the Tribe hereby waives any claim against the United States arising out of:

1. The negotiation of this Agreement;
2. The adoption of the specific terms of this Agreement;
or
3. Any allegations concerning the lack of authority of the Tribe to enter into this Agreement.

G. Signatures

This Agreement may be entered into in any number of counterparts, and each executed counterpart shall have the same force and effect as an original instrument as if all the parties to the aggregate counterparts had signed the same instrument. Signature pages of this Agreement may be detached from any counterpart of this Agreement without impairing the legal effect of any signatures thereon and may be attached to another counterpart of this Agreement identical in form hereto but having attached to it one or more additional signature pages.

ARIZONA V. CALIFORNIA SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES, THE QUECHAN INDIAN TRIBE OF THE FORT YUMA INDIAN RESERVATION AND THE STATE OF ARIZONA

AGREEMENT

The Quechan Indian Tribe of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation (hereinafter "Tribe"), the United States of America (hereinafter "United States"), and the State of Arizona (hereinafter "Arizona") hereby enter into the following Agreement.

I

RECITALS

- A. On October 10, 1989, the United States Supreme Court granted The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California and other parties' Motion to reopen the Decree in *Arizona v. California*, 373 U.S. 546 (1963) ("*Arizona I*") to determine the disputed boundary claims with respect to the Fort Mojave, Colorado River and Fort Yuma Indian Reservations and referred the matter to a Special Master for resolution. *Arizona v. California*, 493 U.S. 886 (1989).
- B. The boundary issue concerning the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation involves water rights claims associated with lands which are the subject of an 1893 Agreement between the Tribe and the United States. The 1893 Agreement was subsequently ratified by Congress on August 15, 1894. See 28 Stat. 332 (August 15, 1894).
- C. In his Memorandum Opinion and Order No. 4, September 6, 1991, Special Master McGarr ruled that the United States and the Tribe were precluded from

asserting claims for water rights in the current litigation. Specifically, the Master concluded that the Tribe and the United States could not pursue claims for water because of a 1983 judgment of the United States Claims Court, which approved a settlement between the United States and the Tribe respecting the disputed boundary lands. *Id.* at 6-8. See also *Quechan Tribe of the Fort Yuma Reservation v. United States*, No. 320 (Cl. Ct. Aug. 11, 1983). The Supreme Court reversed and remanded "the outstanding water rights claims associated with the disputed boundary lands of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation to the Special Master for determination on the merits." *Arizona v. California*, 530 U.S. 392, 419-420 (2000).

- D. In order to resolve the issues referenced above, the United States, the Tribe and the State of Arizona have reached the agreement set forth below.

II

PURPOSE

This Agreement settles all matters now at issue between the parties in this litigation with respect to the water rights claims and boundary of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in Arizona. Except as expressly provided herein, no modification of this Agreement without the consent of the parties shall be effective.

A. Arizona Settlement.

1. Water Rights.

- (a) In addition to the amounts decreed to the Tribe as in *Arizona I*, 376 U.S. 340 (1964), the Tribe shall be entitled to an annual (calendar year) quantity with a priority date of January 9, 1884, not to exceed (a) 6,350 acre-feet of diversions from the

mainstream of the Colorado River or (b) the amount of Colorado River water necessary to supply the consumptive use required for irrigation of 952 acres, and for the satisfaction of related uses, whichever of (a) or (b) is less, for that portion of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation located in the State of Arizona.

- (b) The United States, the Tribe and Arizona agree that the additional allocation of Colorado River water described in (a), above, shall be included in a supplemental decree to be issued by the Supreme Court at the conclusion of the present proceedings and subject to the same terms and conditions as apply to the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation water allocation in the Supreme Court's 1964 Decree, as supplemented.
- (c) The United States, the Tribe and Arizona agree further that the Tribe's present perfected water rights as set forth in the Decree in *Arizona I*, 376 U.S. 340 (1964), shall remain undisturbed and shall not be affected in any manner by the terms of this Agreement.
- (d) Upon entry of the supplemental decree by the Supreme Court in this matter, the United States and the Tribe, waive and extinguish any claim, cognizable in law or equity, that might exist on that date, for the benefit of the Tribe or by the Tribe, of a right to use of Colorado River water in amounts in excess of the amounts set out in the 1964 Decree and the supplemental decree to be entered in this matter or with a priority date other than the priority dates set out in said decree. In addition, the Tribe, upon entry of the supplemental decree of the Tribal water right by the United States Supreme Court, also waives and extin-

guishes any claim, cognizable in law or equity, that might exist on that date against the United States, Arizona, and governmental subdivisions thereof, or any person, that they have diverted, pumped, or impounded (or have permitted others to divert, pump, or impound), waters of the Colorado River, decreed to the Tribe or that had been claimed or could have been claimed, prior to the date of the entry of a supplemental decree by the United States Supreme Court.

2. Disputed Boundary in Arizona. The parties agree that the boundary for the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in Arizona shall be the boundary as described in the Executive Order of January 9, 1884, subject to applicable federal law regarding the movement of the Colorado River. For the purposes of this agreement only, the parties agree that the Bureau of Land Management Cadastral Survey dated October 22, 1980 which contains five plates depicting the reservation boundary (the "1980 BLM Survey") shall be the depiction of the exterior boundary of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in Arizona, and shall remain as the exterior boundary of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation in Arizona until and unless all of the following events occur, in which case the exterior Fort Yuma Indian Reservation boundary in Arizona shall change accordingly:

- (a) The Tribe or Arizona files with a federal agency, administrative tribunal or court having the jurisdiction to review the sufficiency of the instructions for the 1980 BLM survey of the exterior Fort Yuma Indian Reservation boundary in Arizona, a challenge on the ground that the survey instructions incorrectly ordered portions of the exterior Fort Yuma Indian Reservation boundary in Arizona to end at the right bank of the abandoned channel of

the 1902-03, 1920 or 1954 Colorado River rather than further east at the center of the river channel;

- (b) The final decision of such federal agency, administrative tribunal or court, after exhaustion of all administrative and judicial appeals, finds that the 1980 BLM survey instructions were in error on the basis that the instructions incorrectly ordered portions of the exterior Fort Yuma Indian Reservation boundary in Arizona to end at the right bank of the abandoned channel of the 1902-03, 1920 or 1954 Colorado River channel, rather than further east at the center of the river channel, and further orders that the BLM conduct a new survey of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation exterior boundary in Arizona to the center of the abandoned channel; and
- (c) A new survey of the exterior Fort Yuma Indian Reservation boundary in Arizona is conducted by BLM in accordance with the final decision of an agency, administrative tribunal or court as described above, and all administrative and judicial appeals to the new survey have been exhausted.

Future resurveys of the exterior Fort Yuma Indian Reservation boundary in Arizona, except a resurvey conducted by BLM upon the occurrence of all of the above-described events and upon the basis set forth above, shall not change the exterior Fort Yuma Indian Reservation boundary in Arizona. Nothing in this paragraph is intended to limit the Secretary's authority to survey and resurvey federal lands. A true and correct copy of the 1980 BLM Survey is attached hereto and incorporated by this reference as Exhibit "A."

B. Scope, Effective Date and Waiver. This Agreement merges all prior negotiations and understandings between the parties, contains their entire agreement and shall be effective upon unqualified recommended approval by the Special Master in his report to the United States Supreme Court in these proceedings and the Court's unqualified approval of the Special Master's report on this issue and the issuance of an appropriate decree. Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed to create or give validity to any claim by the Tribes against the United States or in any way constitute acknowledgment of the validity of any claims by the Tribes against the United States. In addition, the Tribe hereby waives any claim against the United States arising out of:

1. The negotiation of this Agreement;
2. The adoption of the specific terms of this Agreement;
or
3. The allegations concerning the lack of authority of the Tribes to enter into this Agreement.

C. Nothing in this Agreement is intended or shall be construed to (a) affect any right, claim, or interest in lands of any person, natural, corporate or political, whether or not a party to this case, or (b) to determine title to or jurisdiction over any such land.

D. Signatures. This Agreement may be entered into in any number of counterparts, and each executed counterpart shall have the same force and effect as an original instrument as if all the parties to the aggregate counterparts had signed the same instrument. Signature pages of this Agreement may be detached from any counterpart of this Agreement without impairing the legal effect of any

counterpart of this Agreement identical in form hereto but having attached to it one or more additional signature pages.

The lowest elevation is along the Colorado River which is 135 ft. above sea level. The highest elevation is a mountain peak near the extreme northwest corner of the survey which is 1,024 ft. above sea level. The mean elevation of the desert floor is 300 ft. above sea level. The many desert washes drain southeasterly and empty into the Colorado River. The Colorado River is the main source of water for this area. The area in the east half of this survey is used chiefly for agricultural purposes and the west half for recreational purposes. There were no minerals noted.</p>

Sec. 1. Solicitor's Opinion

On December 20, 1978 the Solicitor signed an Opinion recognizing that the 1884 Executive Order boundary of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation, as modified by the Executive Order of December 19, 1900, which revoked the portion of the reservation lying south of the Colorado River in the then Territory of Arizona, still remains the reservation boundary. Said Opinion was approved by the Secretary of the Interior on December 20, 1978. A map entitled "Fort Yuma Indian Reservation 1884-1974, revised September 1974 S.D.T.," depicting the general location of the Reservation boundary today is on file in the office of the Area Director, Arizona Bank Building, 3030 N. Central Avenue, Phoenix, Arizona 85013. The exact location of the Reservation boundary shall be determined hereafter by survey in accordance with the boundaries recognized by this Notice of Secretarial Determination and Directives (Notice).

Sec. 2. Recognition of Trust Status of Lands

Except as hereinafter stated, all lands which prior to December 20, 1978, were managed under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Land Management or the Bureau of Reclamation (FNI) and which the map referred to in Section 1 indicates are within the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation (hereafter referred to as "such lands") are hereby recognized as being held in trust by the United States for the Quechan Tribe of the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation as of January 9, 1884.

FNI In order to maintain consistency with the Secretarial order of December 20, 1978, the Water and Power Resources Services is referred to as the Bureau of Reclamation throughout this notice.

Sec. 3. Exceptions and Conditions

The Solicitor's Opinion holds that an 1893 Agreement ratified by an 1894 statute providing for allotment of certain lands on the Fort Yuma Reservation and cession to the United States of other reservation lands was subject to conditions that were never carried out. Although the Solicitor's Opinion holds *11373 that the cession provided for in the Agreement and statute did not take place, and that Reservation lands which would have been ceded in that statute and which were not later taken pursuant to the 1904 statute, remain in tribal ownership, the Solicitor's Opinion also holds that (1) pursuant to statutes predating 1884, certain valid rights were acquired by third parties that are protected by the Executive Order; (2) pursuant to later statutes, various Reclamation project works were validly constructed on the Reservation; and (3) other valid grants and grants which would have been valid had the lands been public lands were made by agencies of the United States to third parties. Accordingly, reaffirmation and recognition of the Tribe's title in such lands is subject to the exceptions and conditions set forth in this Section 3.

a. There is hereby excepted from the provisions and effect of Section 2 herein all rights of third parties created by or pursuant to Acts of Congress including but not limited to the Act of July 26, 1866, 14 Stat.289, and the Act of March 3, 1871, 16 Stat.573, and predating the Executive Order establishing the Reservation in 1884.

b. All rights of third parties to such lands within the now-recognized reservation boundaries which were established pursuant to law prior to December 20, 1978, including but not limited to existing permits, leases, rights-of-way and other non-fee rights and interests, including those generally described in subparagraphs (1) (44) following (and more particularly described in the cited instruments):

(1) LBR Contracts Nos. 14-06-303 -3736, -3737, -3738, -3739, -3740, -3741, -3742, -3743, -3744, -3745, -3746 and -3747, all dated January 1, 1977, consisting of leases for agricultural purposes to various individuals and corporations.

(2) LBR Contract No. 7-07-34-L0026 dated April 15, 1977, issued to Ned Foss for livestock grazing and feeding purposes.

(3) Bureau of Land Management Agricultural Permits, BLM Serial Nos. 1C-1(A), 1C-2(A), 1C-3(A), 1C-5(A), 2C-3(A), 2C-4(A), 2C-5(A), 2C-6(A), 2C-9(A), 2C-14(A), 2C-15(A), 2C-32(A), 2C-35(A), 2C-37(A).

(4) Bureau of Land Management Temporary Residential Permits, BLM Serial Nos. 1C-9(R), 2C-38(R), 2C-41(R), 2C-42(R), 2C-43(R), 2C-44(R), 2C-45(R), 2C-46(R), 2C-48(R), 2C-51(R), 2C-58(R), 2C-CM-4(R), 2C-CM-5(R), 2C-LD-5.

(5) LBR Contract No. 14-06-300-960 issued to California Electric and Power Company on October 6, 1959, for a transmission line.

(6) LBR Contract No. 14-06-303-1330, executed December 5, 1957, and 14-06-303-1412, executed May 9, 1958, consisting of licenses issued to the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company for telephone and telegraph line rights-of-way within and across Bureau of Reclamation levee and canal rights-of-way.

(7) LBR unnumbered contract issued April 5, 1961, for an indefinite period, consisting of license issued to Pacific Telephone and Telegraph for a public phone booth.

(8) LBR Contract Nos. 14-06-303-1119, -1120, -1122, executed July 3, 1956, consisting of licenses issued to Southern Pacific Pipelines, Inc., for a petroleum products pipeline right-of-way within and across Bureau of Reclamation canal lateral and drain rights-of-way.

(9) LBR Contract Nos. I-24-R-635, I-24-R-678, dated June 4, 1951, issued to Imperial County for the removal of sand, gravel and road materials.

(10) LBR No. 7-07-34-L0068, dated September 21, 1977, consisting of a license issued to the County of Imperial, California, for a refuse disposal dump.

(11) LBR Contract No. 14-06-300-2283, issued to the State of Arizona for fish and wildlife management at Mittery Lake.

(12) LBR No. 14-06-303-3748, dated January 1, 1977, consisting of a lease to Gladys Reynolds, for a mobile home park.

(40) LBR Contract No. 14-06-303-2788, executed February 26, 1970, granting to the State of California the right to construct, reconstruct, operate and maintain highway bridges and a highway across the right-of-way reserved for the All-American Canal.

(41) LBR Contract No. 14-06-300-149, consisting of an easement granted to the Imperial Irrigation District on February 19, 1954, (BLM Serial No. R01908) for the

Pilot Knob Power Plant.

(42) BLM Serial No. LA048474, right-of-way to the Imperial Irrigation District, approved December 6, 1930, for poles and transmission line.

(43) 60-foot wide easement along the International boundary reserved by Presidential Proclamation of May 27, 1907, for purposes of patrol and inspection by the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service.

(44) Two powerline extensions into Section 29, T.16S., R.22E. SRM authorized by the March 13, 1967, and April 1, 1966 letters from the Lower Colorado River Land Use Office to cover electric distribution lines to pumps on BLM agricultural permits 1C-1(A) and 1C-3(A).

c. There is hereby excepted from the provisions and effect of Section 2 hereof all rights and interests in lands in the so-called Bard area, including non-contiguous parcels, opened to private settlement pursuant to Section 25 of the Act of April 21, 1904 (33 Stat. 189, 224), including all lands in the Bard area heretofore patented prior to December 20, 1978 pursuant to the Reclamation Law of 1902 and acts amendatory and supplementary thereto and the Act of March 31, 1950, 64 Stat. 39.

As to all rights-of-way listed above which are not on lands listed in Paragraph d of this Section as fee lands of the United States not held in trust for the Quechan Tribe and which were issued under the assumption that the lands involved were not Indian lands, I hereby grant a right-of-way pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Acts of February 5, 1948, 62 Stat. 17, 25 U.S.C. 323-28, each such grant being for the unexpired term of the original grant and subject to precisely the same terms and conditions as contained in the original grant. The Tribe has given its consent to these grants in Resolution R-19-77 dated September 29, 1977, and Resolution R-1-81 dated January 13, 1981, and pursuant to 25 CFR 1.2, I hereby waive the requirements of 25 CFR part 161 pertaining to these rights-of-way, since I find that such waiver is in the best interest of the Quechan Tribe.

As to all other permits, leases and other non-fee rights and interests listed above which are not on lands listed in Paragraph d of this Section as fee lands of the United States not held in trust for the Quechan Tribe, and which were issued under the assumption that the lands involved were not Indian lands, the Tribe has authorized and consented to issuance of such permits, leases and other non-fee rights and interests in Tribal Resolution R-19-77 dated September 29, 1977, and Tribal resolution R-1-81 dated January 13, 1981, and I hereby approve the same, pursuant to authority contained in the Act of May 11, 1938, c. 198, Section 1, 52 Stat. 347, 25 U.S.C. 396a, the Act of August 15, 1894, c. 290, Section 1, 28 Stat. 305, 25 U.S.C. § 402, the Act of July 3, 1926, c. 787, 44 Stat. 894, 25 U.S.C. 402a, and the Act of August 9, 1955, c. 615, Section 1, 69 Stat. 539, 25 U.S.C. 415, and each such permit, lease or other right or interest being for the unexpired term and subject to precisely the same terms and conditions specified in the original instrument. Pursuant to 25 CFR 1.2, I hereby waive the requirements of 25 CFR Parts 131, 151 and 171 pertaining to these permits, leases and other rights and interests since I find that such waiver is in the best interest of the Quechan

Tribe.

d. There is hereby expected from the provisions and effect of Section 2 hereof, fee title in the United States without being held in trust for the Quechan Tribe to the works and appurtenances, including but not limited to the works described in the following subparagraphs 1 through 18, constructed pursuant to Congressional authorization, including the Reclamation Act of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat. 388), acts amendatory and supplementary thereto, and the Boulder Canyon Project Act of December 21, 1928 (45 Stat. 1057), and fee title in the United States, without being held in trust for the Quechan Tribe, to lands occupied by all of said works and appurtenances, and there is also reserved the right of the United States, its licensees and contractors, to operate, maintain, and reconstruct said works and appurtenances, including but not limited to:

(1) The All-American Canal, and all appurtenances (including, but not limited to, the Pilot Knob Checkdam and Wasteway back to the Colorado River) as generally shown on Drawing No. 35-300-48 dated February 1968, and Drawing No. 35303-2127 dated June 5, 1967, on file at the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Phoenix Area Realty Property Management Branch and incorporated herein by reference.

(2) Laguna Dam Protection and Security Zone, as shown on Drawing No. 423-300- 704 dated June 6, 1972, on file at the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Phoenix Area Real Property Management Branch and incorporated herein by reference.

(3) Laguna Settling Basin, Sediment Disposal Area and Security Zone, as shown and named as "Channel" and most of the "Wildlife Area" on the above Drawing No. 423-300-704.

(4) Yuma Main Canal, California Wasteway, and Colorado River Siphon. The general location of the Yuma Main Canal and California Wasteway as shown and named on the above Drawing No. 35-300-48. The Siphon under the Colorado River is identified as "Siphon" on Drawing No. 212-303-1100, dated March 14, 1944, on file at the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Phoenix Area Real Property Management Branch and incorporated herein by reference.

(5) Detention Reservoir Opposite Wash Overpasses on All-American Canal. At present, there is only one area defined as a "Detention Reservoir," that being the Detention Reservoir as shown on the above Drawing No. 35-303-2127, basically existing below the All-American Canal. This reservoir is erroneously depicted as being part of the patented Bard area on the map referred to in Section 1 hereof.

(6) Upper and Lower Reservation and Levees. The locations of the Upper and Lower Protective Levees shown on Drawing No. 35-300-48; however, the #11375 Upper Levee is denoted only as "Reservation Levee." Both levees are properly denoted on the above Drawing No. 35-303-2127.

(7) Old Yuma Main Canal. The general location of this facility, a large portion of which is utilized as an interceptor drain, is shown on the above Drawing No. 212-303-1100.

(8) Irrigation Canals and Laterals in Reservation Division Yuma Project. Drawings

Nos. 35-3-303-127 and 35-300-48 above show these irrigation facilities.

(9) All Drainage Channels as Presently Exist. Drawings Nos. 35-303- 2127 and 35-300-48 above, indicate these facilities.

(10) Siphon Drop and Pilot Knob Power Plants together with existing Related Transmission Lines and Appurtenances. Both the Siphon Drop and Pilot Knob Power Plant locations as shown on the above Drawing No. 35-300-48, respectively named "Siphon Drop Power Plant" and "Pilot Knob Plant." In both cases, related facilities and appurtenances such as the Pilot Knob Drop, residences, other buildings, and related transmission lines and communication lines are not identified on any drawing.

(11) Well Clusters. Several well clusters are placed along the Colorado River Flood Plain in conjunction with the U.S. Geological Survey, the purpose of which is a study to measure return flows. There is no reproducible drawing that would show as a composite the locations. The general locations are shown by "blue" lines on the above Drawing No. 35-300-48.

(12) Parker-Davis 161-Kv Transmission Line. This line traverses the area from its crossing of the Colorado River westerly to the Pilot Knob Substation. The location is shown on the above Drawing No. 35-300-48.

(13) Boundary Pumping Plant 34.5-Kv Transmission Line. This line interties the Valley Division's boundary pumping plant, the Yuma County Water Users' Association Headquarters Building, California Wasteway, Siphon Drop, and Imperial Dam, and is shown on the above Drawing No. 35-300-48.

(14) Interconnecting Telephone Electrical, and Remote Control Lines to Project Features. These features, which are appurtenances to other project facilities, are not contained on any drawings but are largely within rights-of-way of other project features.

(15) Senator Wash Dam 69-Kv Transmission Line. Location shown on the above Drawing No. 35-300-38.

(16) Collector Line (South Gila Drainage). Location shown on Drawing No. 35-300-48 by "blue" pencil line extending from the Colorado River to South Gila Levee.

(17) South Gila Levee (including Main Outlet Drain Extension). Location shown by Drawing No. 35-300-48 as revised in ink to show now existing conditions resulting from installation of a siphon to replace the earlier flume.

(18) Gauging Station. Location shown by "blue" pencil mark below the letters "ol" in the word "seminole" on Drawing No. 35-300-48, below the Winterhaven townsite, including access road to cable gauging station in Section 27, T.16S, R 22 E. SBM California.

Provided, however, that should any of the above works and rights-of-way (excepting the works described in subparagraphs (1), (4), and (10) hereto), be abandoned or cease to be used in connection with authorized Reclamation projects

by the United States as determined in writing by the Secretary of the Interior equitable title thereto shall revert to the Tribe, in all instances where the Tribe owns equitable title to all lands immediately adjoining said works. A survey of the locations and extent of the areas occupied by the works and rights-of-way referred to above and the material sites referred to in paragraph 7 below will be made as promptly as possible by the United States without cost to the Tribe, and the results of that survey shall be reported to the Tribe, with any dispute referred to the Secretary for resolution.

e. There is hereby reserved to the United States, its officers, agents, employees, contractors, patentees, licensees, and holders of other rights, the right of ingress to, passage over and egress from such lands over existing or relocated roadways at all times for the purpose of exercising the rights specified in this Order and for all lawful purposes in connection with the maintenance and operation of all Reclamation works: Provided, however, That new roadways will not be constructed on reservation lands without consent of the Tribe, and that existing roadways may be relocated by the Tribe at its own expense so long as their adequacy for the purpose served by the original roadway is approved by the agency or organization using the roadway to the relocation of the roadway.

f. The Tribe's equitable title to such lands within the flood plain of the Colorado River, including Laguna Dam South Recreational Area, shall be subject to the rights of the United States under the Act of June 28, 1946, 60 Stat 338. The Tribe shall not construct or install or permit the construction or installation of any permanent improvements of such lands within the flood plain or floodway, as shown by "red" coloring on Drawing No. 423-300-1036 (Bureau of Reclamation, Flood Plain Information Colorado River-Imperial Dam to San Luis, Plate 3 (August 1973)), on file at the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Phoenix Area Branch of Real Property Management and incorporated herein by reference, nor will the Tribe permit said lands to be used in any manner inconsistent, with or contrary to, the purpose or intent of Executive Order No. 11988.

g. There is hereby reserved to the United States the right to continue in exclusive possession of all presently used material sites located within the now recognized reservation boundaries, of sand, gravel, fill, clay and rock to the extent reasonably necessary for operation and maintenance of its project works; Provided, however, That the sites are abandoned or the use thereof is changed in any substantial manner by the United States, possession shall revert to the Tribe at its option. Provided, further, That the United States shall pay to the Tribe fair market value of any and all materials removed from these sites from and after the date of this Order, and shall make regular periodic reports to the Tribe concerning the value of all materials removed.

Sec. 4. Miscellaneous Provisions

a. Nothing contained herein shall prevent the Tribe from recovering whatever compensation it may be determined is appropriate in any proceeding now pending or hereafter brought against the United States for past use of such lands.

b. The Quechan Tribe has agreed, pursuant to Tribal Resolution #0R-1-81 dated January 13, 1981, to relinquish any claim for damages it might have for trespass

against third parties who acquired rights-of-way across such lands from the United States under the assumption that such lands were not Indian lands.

c. Any claim for water rights in addition to that amount presently enjoyed under Arizona v. California, asserted in relation to such lands, will be predicated only upon the criteria heretofore employed in Arizona v. California.

c. The Order determines the respective interests to such lands of the United States and the Quechan Tribe, subject to the provisions of Section 3 of this Order. This Order does not affect any claim of the State of Arizona or the State of California or any successor of interest thereof may have to such lands.

d. All agencies of the Department are hereby directed promptly to take all necessary steps to implement the *11376 Opinion of the Solicitor and the terms of this Notice of Secretarial Determination and Directives.

**Proposed Supplemental
Decree**

Proposed Supplemental Decree

It is ORDERED, ADJUDGED, AND DECREED:

A. Paragraph (3) of Article II(D) of the Decree in this case, entered on March 9, 1964 (376 U.S. 340, 344), is hereby amended to read as follows:

(3) The Yuma Indian Reservation in annual quantities not to exceed (i) 77,966 acre-feet of diversions from the mainstream or (ii) the quantity of mainstream water necessary to supply the consumptive use required for irrigation of 11,694 acres and for the satisfaction of related uses, whichever of (i) or (ii) is less, with a priority date of January 9, 1884.

B. Paragraph (5) of the introductory conditions to the Supplemental Decree in this case, entered on January 9, 1979 (439 U.S. 419, 421-423), and supplemented by paragraph (C) of the Supplemental Decree in this case, entered on October 10, 2000 (531 U.S. 1, 2), is hereby amended by adding the following exception at the end of the concluding proviso in the first sentence of that paragraph: "except for the western boundaries of the Fort Mojave and Colorado River Indian Reservations in California and except for the boundaries of the Yuma Indian Reservation in Arizona and California."

C. The Paragraph I(A) of the Supplemental Decree in this case, entered on January 9, 1979 (439 U.S. 419, 423), and supplemented by Paragraph (B) of the Second Supplemental Decree in this case, entered on April 16, 1984 (466 U.S. 144, 145), is amended to read as follows:

I

ARIZONA

A. Federal Establishments' Present Perfected Rights

The federal establishments named in Art II, subdivision (D), paragraphs (2), (3), (4) and (5) of the Decree entered March 9, 1964, in this case, such rights having been decreed in Art II:

D. Paragraph II(A)(23) of the Supplemental Decree in this case, entered on January 9, 1979 (439 U.S.419, 428), is hereby amended to read as follows:

E. Except as otherwise provided herein, the Decree entered on March 9, 1964, and the Supplemental Decrees entered on January 9, 1979, April 16, 1984, and October 10, 2000, shall remain in full force and effect.

F. Pursuant to Paragraph IX of the Decree in this case, entered on March 9, 1964 (376U.S. 340, 353), the Court shall retain jurisdiction herein to order such further proceedings and enter such supplemental decree as may be deemed appropriate.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

This proposed supplemental decree is modeled after the Supplemental Decree entered in 2000 to implement the settlement of the claims for the Fort Mojave and Colorado River Indian Reservations. This proposed supplemental decree will implement both settlement agreements.

A. This paragraph amends the 1964 Decree which decreed present perfected rights for the federal establishments without division among the States to increase the amounts decreed for the Yuma Indian Reservation per the two settlements. The acre-foot figure is the total diversion figure for both Arizona and California [$6,350 + 71,616 = 77,966$]. The acreage figure is the total acreage figure for both Arizona and California [$952 + 10,472 = 11,694$].

B. This amends the existing reservation of jurisdiction to adjust the present perfected rights of the Indian reservations when the boundaries are finally determined to add to the Yuma Indian Reservation to list of those excluded from the adjustment provision. This makes the water rights final as to the reservation.

C. This paragraph amends the 1979 Decree which divided the present perfected rights for the federal establishments among the states to include the Yuma Indian Reservation in the Arizona list and to specify the amount decreed for the Yuma Indian Reservation in Arizona. The acre-foot and acreage figures are from the Arizona settlement. It was necessary to restate the entire paragraph, following the form of the 1984 Supplemental Decree in order to add the reference to paragraph (3) in the introductory phrase. The Yuma Indian Reservation present perfected right in Arizona is assigned paragraph number 3a, so as not to throw off the numbering of all subsequent present perfected rights paragraphs in the 1979 Supplemental Decree.

D. This paragraph amends the 1979 Decree which divided the present perfected rights for the federal establishments among the states to increase the amount decreed for the Yuma Indian Reservation in California. The acre-foot figure is computed by adding the settlement figure to the existing decreed figure [$20,000 + 51,616 = 71,616$]. The acreage figure is computed by adding the settlement figure to the existing decreed figure and rounding up [$2,998.50 + 7,743.00 = 10,741.50$, rounded to 10,742].

E. This paragraph makes clear that the 1964 Decree and the 1979, 1984 and 2000 Supplemental decrees remain in force and are not repealed by omission.

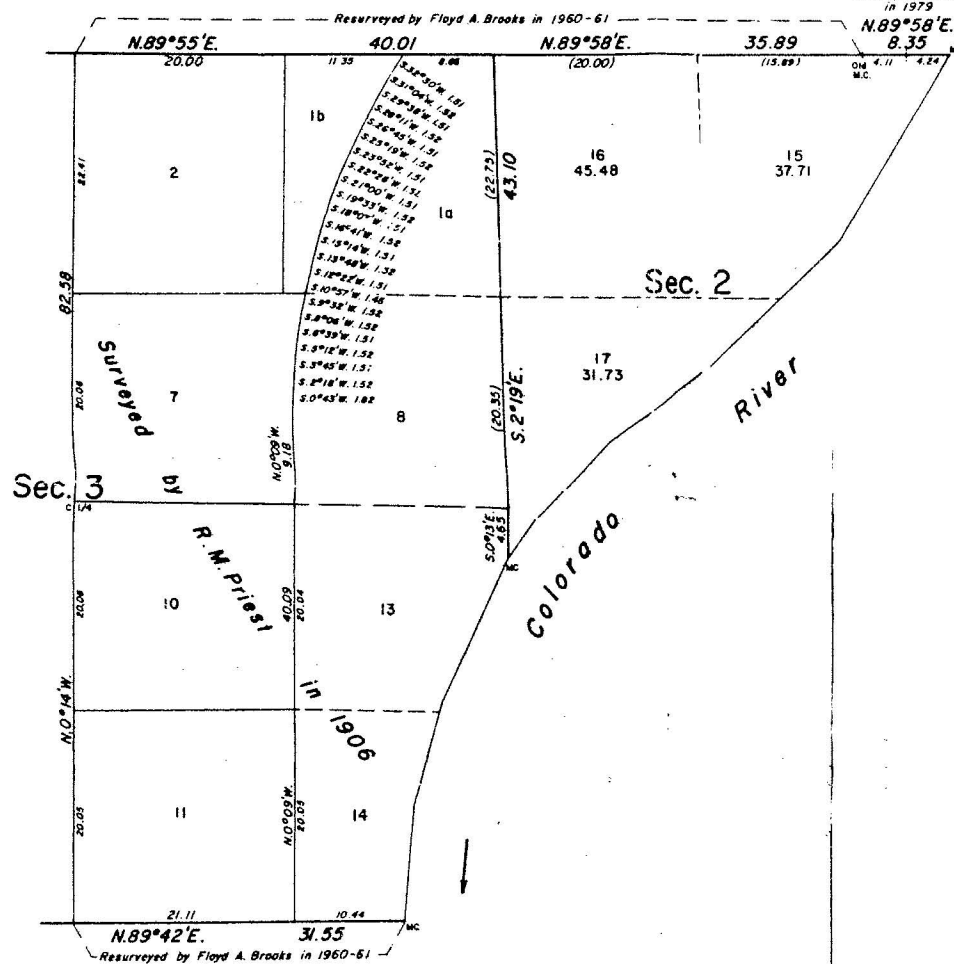
F. The 1984 and 2000 Supplemental Decrees contained a reservation of jurisdiction that did not contain the introductory qualification here. Because the reservation of jurisdiction in Art IX of the 1964 Decree is very important to the States, a reservation of jurisdiction paragraph is included in this proposed supplemental decree that is explicitly tied to Art IX to make clear that the Court is not discharging jurisdiction over the case.

The surveys were executed by Jack W. Rabedew, Supervisory Cadastral Surveyor, from December 1, 1979, to March 26, 1980, pursuant to Special and Supplemental Special Instructions dated October 15, 1979, and October 30, 1979, respectively, which provided for the surveys included under Group No. 614, Arizona and Group No. 747, California.

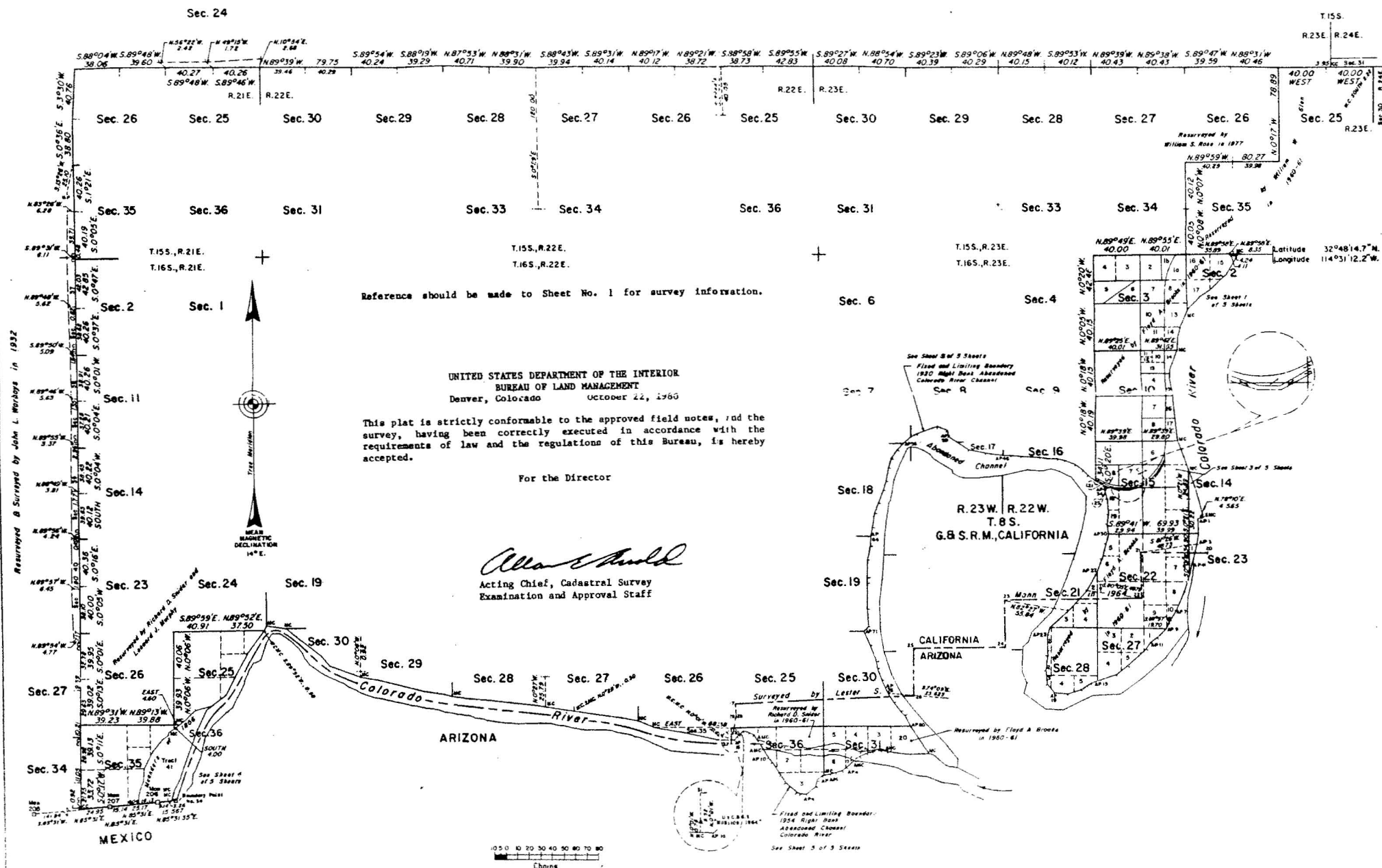

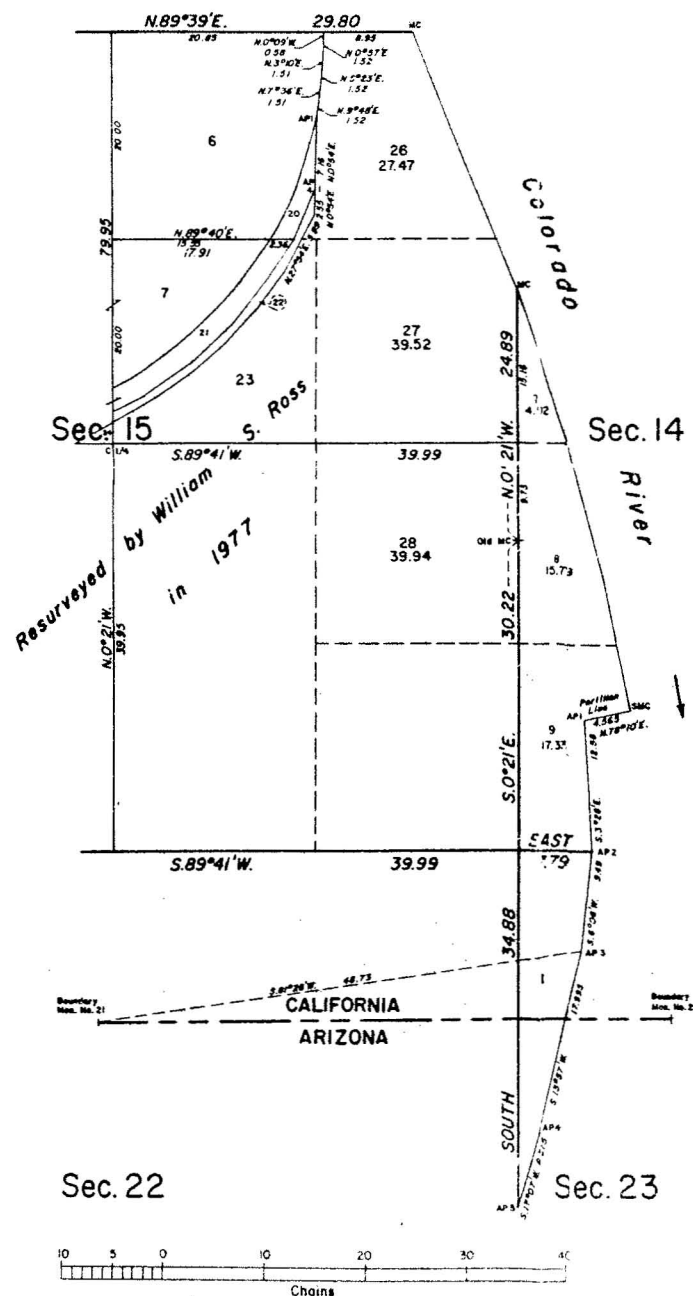

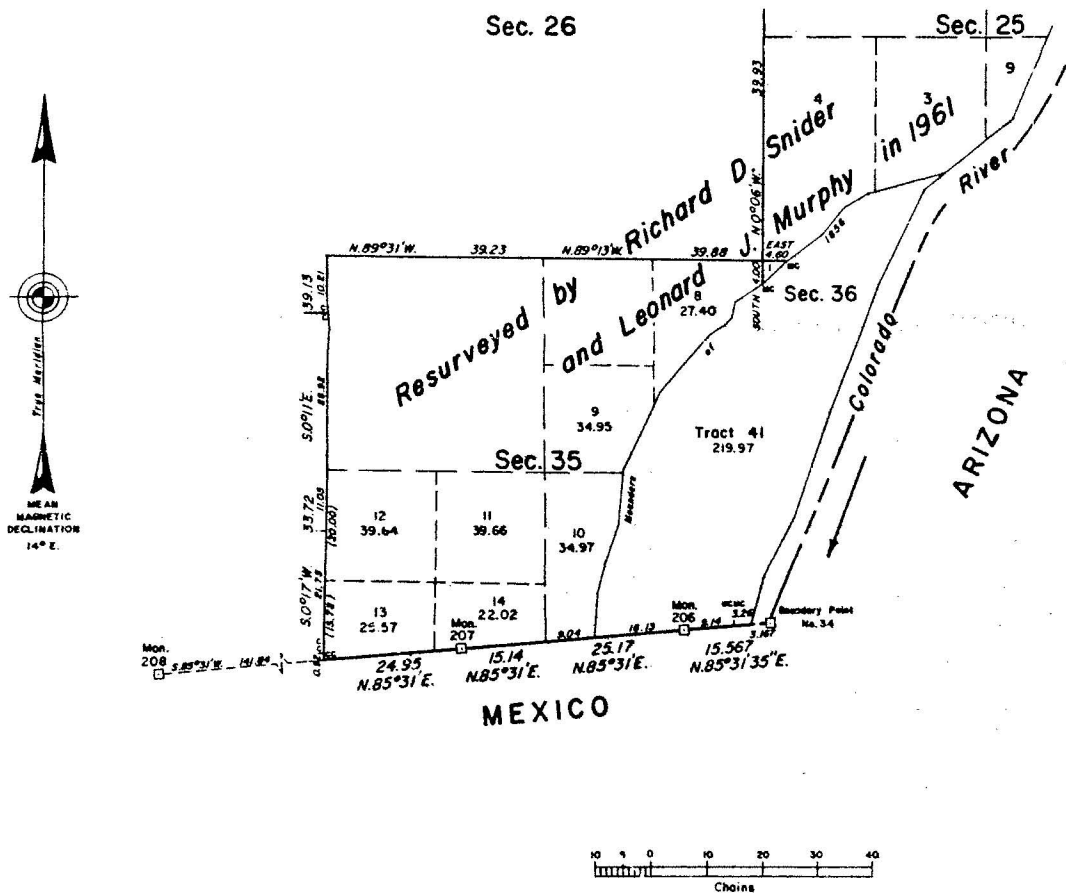
