

# A look inside: Council approves annual City budget

At their June 10th meeting, City Council approved the 2026 City Budget (the fiscal/budget year for the City goes from July 1st through June 30th of the following year, so fiscal year 2026 started this past July 1st for the City). Prior to this meeting, they had held a public hearing for the preliminary budget, and a public hearing was held earlier in the June 10th meeting. At the last public hearing there was only one member of the public who commented: Gayna Salinas encouraged the City Council and citizens to review the budget line

Municipal accounting is tricky: money is split up between 13 funds and different government and bank accounts, so it's a little difficult to get a simple overall picture of a city's finances. Every fund has to balance, so the City covers any "losses".

Case in point: even though the Museum Fund didn't have a General Fund Transfer in 2025, the City still made up the negative "change in position" of \$242,562.

While the Water and Sewer Funds had dramatic increases in revenue in 2025, these are largely due to project-specific grants.



# Local groups sue developer of luxury resort

by LIVING RIVERS and KANE CREEK DEVELOPMENT WATCH (MOAB)

Living Rivers and Kane Creek Development Watch (hereafter referenced together as "Watch") have filed a lawsuit in the Seventh Iudicial District Court of Grand County challenging the validity of the water rights claimed by Kane Creek luxury resort developers ("Developers"). lawsuit states that the Developers' groundwater and Colorado River water rights were not put to beneficial use for more than seven years, which, under Utah law, means the water rights are subject to forfeiture. Development, even the preliminary bulldozing, cannot legally continue without a water supply.

Local opposition to the proposed Kane Creek luxury resort has been strong and consistent, with residents voicing concerns at standing-room only public hearings. "This project does nothing to address Grand County's affordable housing crisis—in fact, it makes it worse," said Laura Long, a Watch activist and frequent speak-

er at the hearings. "It's an exclusive enclave for wealthy investors that would drive up land prices, strain local infrastructure, cost local taxpayers money, and destroy the natural character of the canyon and the Colorado River floodplain." The resort proposal (which has changed several times) calls for over 550 high-end housing units, 70,000 square feet of commercial space, and 100 overnight accommodations in the heart of the Kings Bottom area.

Dave Closser, a Moab resident, has been monitoring the resort's progress from the beginning. He is concerned about safety and delays on Kane Creek Boulevard, a rough and narrow gateway access road for public recreation traversed daily by tourists and Grand County residents alike. "The resort construction and massive infrastructure development will make accessing all of Kane Creek Boulevard, and nearby recreation areas, difficult and dangerous for years. There will be long delays on the narrow road along the River, and there are



no go-arounds. Local businesses could be forced to cancel or reduce their operations which will trickle down to their bottom line and the pockets of their employees. And who is going to pay for the road expansion? It's going to cost millions of dollars, and the federal government has already declined to fund it." Several local tourism business owners submitted statements in support of the lawsuit, noting that the resort and its water use could damage their businesses.

Kane Creek Development Watch is a grassroots citizen's group based in Moab. It sprung up in 2024, in response to this resort proposal. Its strong network of donors and activists have been pushing back against the well-funded and politically-connected Developers, including by funding this lawsuit (which is funded entirely by hundreds of local residents and visitors) and collecting 17,850 signatures from residents and others opposed to this massive resort. Watch is dually focused on (a) mitigating impacts from the development on the unique area it would decimate, the surrounding ecosystem, and adjoining public lands, as well as (b) preventing additional strain on the water supply of the Colorado River and its tributaries, which are over-appropriated.

### Bring Her Back

Rating: R: for strong disturbing bloody violent content, some grisly images, graphic nudity, underage drinking, and language



I always go into a horror film wanting it to live up to the trailer, but I know that it probably won't. Even the best horror movies have little things here or there that are out of place or don't fully work.

Not so with *Bring Her Back*. I can confidently say that this fulfilled all expectations and then some. This is emotionally poignant, very creepy, and often completely gruesome. It is full of incredible effects work and gorgeous direction. So many shots in this are beautiful, even if they are hard to



watch, and I was impressed with the attention to detail throughout.

Bring Her Back follows newly orphaned siblings Adam (Billy Barratt) and Piper (Sora Wong) entering their new foster home. Their kooky new foster mother, Laura (Sally Hawkins), and mute foster brother Ollie (Jonah Wren Phillips) color their new home with oddball energy. But Laura's strange behavior slowly builds into something more dangerous than any of them could have ever imagined. This checked every box for me. The pacing is

exact and each small reveal, spooky set-piece or terrifying occurrence makes way for something even more skin crawling and eerie. The narrative is unforgiving and pretty vicious, and I soon realized that no character was safe. That being said, it also carries a surprising amount of emotional heft and I found it as devastating as it was terrifying.

The performances from the roster of child actors are great. Barratt and Wong are such a sympathetic brother and sister pair and have some serious acting chops. And Wren Phillips portrays the scariest child in the last decade of horror.

Obviously the standout here is Sally Hawkins. She is a chameleon and one of the world's biggest acting underdogs. This film only serves to reinforce her incredible body of work. She is so scary and sad and weird in this. I couldn't get enough. This is horror perfection.

# Travelin' with Tony Capitol Reef National


Park: July 4-6, 2025

Making a trip to a national park feels like the best way to spend the Fourth of July weekend. I feel our National Parks are one of our greatest ideas as a nation.

Ansel Adams famously said, "No matter how sophisticated you may be, a large granite mountain cannot be denied - it speaks in silence to the very core of your being". I have similar feelings regarding sheer sandstone cliffs. Upon arriving at our campsite, I was delighted to see the rugged sandstone cliffs to both our North and South. I immediately knew I had to take a photo featuring this. After a brief walk around the area, I decided to take a photo of the historic Pendleton Barn in front of the sandstone cliffs.

The next day, we woke up early to hike Sulphur Creek. Sulphur Creek is a six-mile hike through a slot canyon featuring several waterfalls. Hiking the creek requires frequent walking in ankle-deep water, occasional thighhigh water, and optional chesthigh water. These conditions can vary based on weather, and I feel it should go without saying, but don't hike in a slot canyon when there is any possibility of rain in the forecast. This trail also has several spots where you have to use your hands to lower yourself

down off of ledges. While you take in the beauty in front of you, be sure to occasionally turn around to see the beauty that is behind you. The most exhilarating part of this hike is at the final waterfall. Here you have the option of scooting around a ledge and lowering yourself down, or you can slide down the waterfall into the chest-high water below. Thanks to my traveling companions I was able to do the latter while they lowered my backpack down to me.

After our hike, we drove into the town of Torrey, where we ate at a food truck called Capitol Burger. I had the mac and cheese burger. It was a delicious blend of familiar ingredients. After our lunch, we ventured to Etta Place Cidery. We each sampled a flight

of different ciders. I went with a set of the sweeter ciders they had on offer. I particularly enjoyed their Grand Circle Semi-Dry cider and the Wassail Spiced Cider. I was going to purchase a bottle of each from their bottle shop, but they were out of the Wassail Spiced, so I got two of the Grand Circle. After purchasing our ciders, we returned to camp and spent the rest of the evening making s'mores and talking around the fire. The next day, we packed up our camp and hiked the Hickman Bridge Natural Bridge trail. While this hike was shorter both in distance and duration, I felt it was more strenuous than Sulphur Creek because of the elevation changes and the lack of shade. Seeing the Hickman Bridge was worth the hike, despite

how much I hate hiking uphill. Being one of the park's more popular trails, this hike was more populated than yesterday's, but luckily we went early enough that it still wasn't too busy.

One of my favorite things about this whole trip is that it never felt like it was too crowded. Capitol Reef is Utah's least-visited National Park. While I selfishly enjoy this, there are downsides to it as well. With budget cuts already happening to our parks, the less-visited parks will be the most affected. I encourage every American to visit our national parks, at least once in their lives, if not at least once a year. I will certainly be returning to Capitol Reef. There is a lot more I want to explore. 🗳
